## A word from our Chairman

The Wakatipu High School Foundation celebrated **its eighth year of operation in 2021** and despite the challenges that Covid-19 has continued to present our close-knit community, the WHS Foundation has enjoyed **more support from the community** than any other time in our history.



It is my pleasure to bring you the Wakatipu High School (WHS) Foundation's 2021 Impact Report. I have been delighted to work with the WHS Foundation's Board of Trustees and collaborate with WHS Principal Steve Hall and Board of Trustees Chair Charlie Philips and WHS Senior Leadership team on our vision to support the best educational opportunities for WHS students.

Our impact report highlights the many initiatives we have supported this year that make a meaningful impact such as: smaller class sizes and a larger curriculum offering was supported through providing additional teacher resource with a teacher and a teacher aide, student wellbeing continued to be a focus through the Peer Support Programme and WHS staff development through a senior leadership workshop with Dr Peter Blyde.

COVID-19 has continued to have a significant impact on our community and has highlighted the hardship that some of our families have been experiencing. Demand for our Awhi Hardship fund increased with 10% of WHS families making an application. We were pleased to provide \$45,000 in this area to ensure all our students walk through the front door as equals and with equal access to the great all round education that WHS offers.

This year, we have worked with many wonderful people that share our belief that education is the key to a brighter future. I want to acknowledge our donors, supporters, team members and business partners that have all played a role in making our support of WHS students possible. In particular, I would like to acknowledge our 2022 Endowment Donors Mr Al Rashid, and Mary and John Thompson as well as our inaugural Spend my Super

The school community has the privilege of occupying one of the newest high schools in NZ however buildings don't deliver a great education. **Being well resourced with quality leadership, teachers, programmes and support staff do.** This does not happen off just the funding provided by the Ministry of Education which, to our school due to its decile 10 rating, is the lowest funding level in NZ

donor John Harman. A special mention goes to Jack McPherson for his generous donation of \$100,000 to the Outdoor Education programme. The generosity of these donors has given us the confidence to increase our annual grants to WHS to \$350,000 in 2022.

### Our future focus

Looking forward, it is clear our work is not yet done. When we founded the WHS Foundation in 2013 it was with the particular goal to address funding shortfalls and ensure all our students could leave high school with a valued education and the confidence to chase their aspirations for their future. We estimated, that to make a meaningful difference, a sum of \$300 per student should be our goal.

As the school roll grows, the level of funding required to continue our meaningful impact at WHS also grows and cannot be provided through running events alone. On page 12 you will see our forecast for the future and our focus on providing sustainable funding to support WHS



in perpetuity. To achieve these goals for our youth, we need your support and that of the wider Wakatipu community.

Our trustees and team are all looking forward to working with you to support our goals for the future of the WHS Foundation and supporting WHS to Reach for their Heights.

## Our Story

The WHS Foundation's goal is to **support Wakatipu's only High School** to provide the best all-round education for Wakatipu youth.

Currently, the Queenstown district is one of the least affordable in all of New Zealand, yet as a Decile 10 school, Wakatipu High School (WHS) receives the lowest funding level from the Ministry of Education.

The WHS Foundation was established as a charitable trust in 2013 to support WHS in delivering an outstanding education and to oversee the management and prudent investment of the generous gifts and donations from our school community.



Originally founded on a generous \$500,000 endowment from the Peter Wilding Estate, the WHS Foundation now works with a wide range of supportive community members, businesses and funders to ensure ongoing support for WHS.

Thanks to the generosity of our community, the WHS Foundation has provided more than \$1.25 million for programmes at the school. This year, another \$350,000 will be invested in the future of WHS students.

**Our vision** is for all WHS students to be enabled to **meet their potential** in a supportive and well-resourced environment.

## Our School

WHS is a Decile 10 state-funded co-ed year 9-13 school of approx 1,200 students.

## Academic Results 2021

### → UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE

68% of Year 13 students achieved University Entrance, ahead of the national average of 50.3% and Decile 8-10 schools of 67.4%.

### → NCEA LEVEL 2

NCEA Level 2 is a significant qualification which is regarded nationally as very important for young people and their futures.

94% of students achieved NCEA Level 2, above the national average of 77.2% and above decile 8-10 results (84.8%).

19% of Year 12 students achieve NCEA Level 2 with Excellence achieved.

### → SCHOLARSHIP

16 students achieved Scholarships.

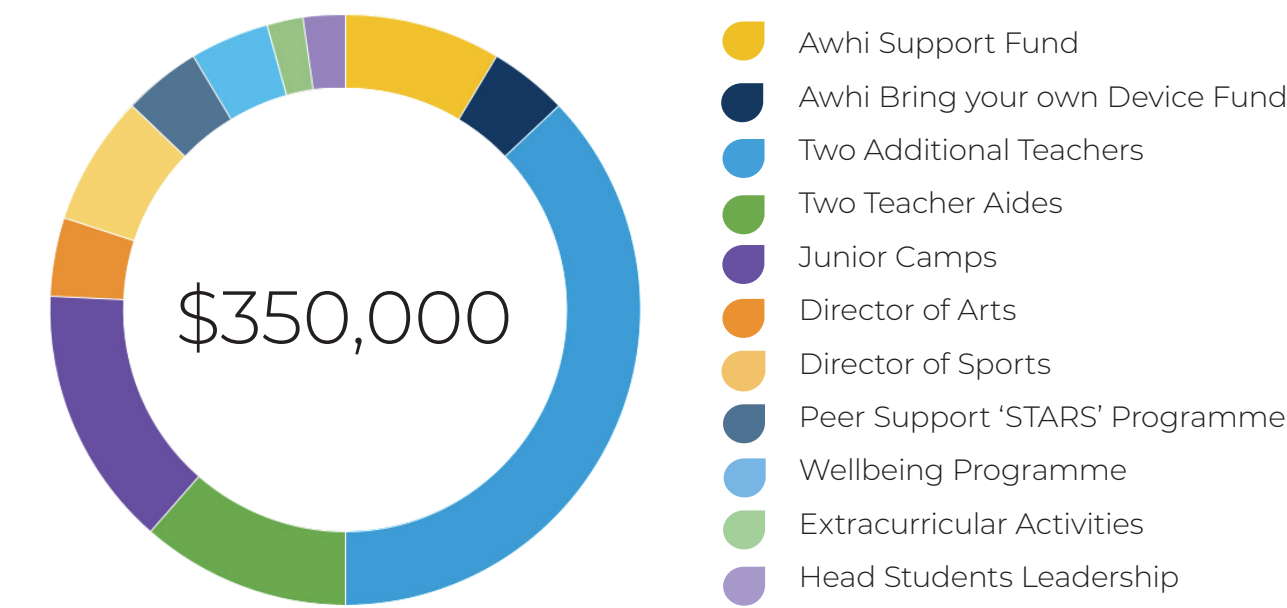
Scholarship is optional and undertaken by our top scholars - and preparing for them often includes extra tutorials before and/or after school throughout the year, and achieving a Scholarship is the pinnacle of academic achievement.

# Annual Initiatives

The WHS Foundation is the vehicle by which the school and our community can realise their vision for a vibrant, meaningful education for Wakatipu youth.



The funds raised in 2021 have enabled the WHS Foundation to increase our support to WHS by 75% to \$350,000 for 2022.

### Outdoor Education: Junior Camps

Outdoor education at WHS is an important part of the fabric of our school, partly because of the stunning environment we all live, work and play in, but also because of the part it plays in the holistic development of students. Our Junior Camps such as the Year 9 Greenstone Camps and the Year 10 Branches Camp - now beyond its 50th year, have become iconic for Wakatipu youth as through camps such as these the students learn about themselves, others, personal growth, social development and citizenship.

### Director of Sports

The Director of Sports position allows WHS to strategically grow and develop both participation and performance pathways - integral to providing a great all-round education.

### Awahi Support Fund

The purpose of the Awahi Fund is to ensure equity of access to Wakatipu High School's great all-round education. The Awahi Fund ensures no students are disadvantaged by financial hardship - making a very real difference to financially disadvantaged families.

### Director of Arts

A new position in 2022, the Director of Arts allows WHS to grow both participation and excellence pathways - integral to providing a great all-round education.

### Additional Teaching Resource

This fund enables WHS to employ two additional teachers above Government staffing entitlement, lowering average class sizes and increasing the subjects offered to students.

### Peer Support STARS Programme

The STARS programme is a year-long peer mentoring programme that supports, motivates and positively reinforces Year 9 students and develops leadership in senior students.

### Wellbeing Programme

Wellbeing is increasingly an issue for NZ teenagers and schools. This fund supports a Wellbeing Coordinator position to continue the development and delivery of a whole-school wellbeing programme for students and staff.

### Head Student Leadership

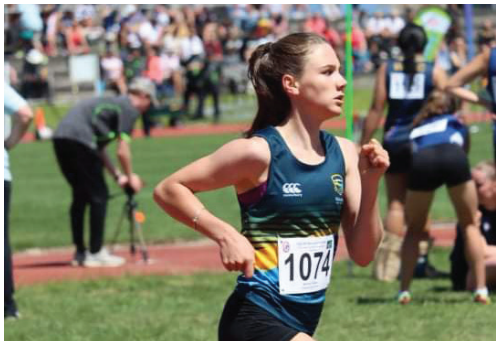
As part of their generous support of the WHS Foundation, Colliers support our Head Boy and Girl to attend an Outward Bound Course.

### Extracurricular Activities

This fund is used to recognise the many coaches, managers, teachers-in-charge that support the wide range of extracurricular activities at WHS.

### Two Teacher Aides

Teacher Aides are used in a variety of ways to support students' with learning differences.



# Looking forward: Growth and future needs


Since 2013, our vibrant region has undergone a period of sustained growth with a 62% increase in population, outpacing the national growth of 15%<sup>1</sup>. As our region has grown, so too has the Wakatipu High School (WHS) roll and the level of support WHS requires to continue offering the best possible opportunities to our Wakatipu students.

# Our Priorities



Covid combined with the region’s growing population has shone a light on how unsustainable it is for the WHS Foundation to rely on events and ad hoc funding opportunities to support our commitment to WHS. During 2021 and 2022, many of our fundraising events were cancelled and uncertainty remains for future events.

Similar to many other organisations over the last two years we recognise the need to adapt to meet these changing times and strengthen our ties with our community to develop perpetual and sustainable funding streams to generate over \$500,000 per year as well as continuing to invest in the future through our endowment investment fund.

Drive further engagement and support through our local business network.

Offer engaging events that give our community an opportunity to be involved and are flexible with the changing conditions.

The WHS Foundation Endowment Fund was established in 2013 to provide perpetual funding to **benefit current and future generations.**



### Gift

An establishment gift is made and forms the principal.



### Invest

The principal is protected, invested and grows.



### Grant

A portion of the fund's value is distributed annually - forever

Endowments provide a stable funding base to drive the teaching missions of the institution, assisting them to survive storms and making them less reliant on public funding mechanisms and changes that may occur to those mechanisms.

Our endowment fund objectives reflect WHS's unique position as the only high school in the Wakatipu Basin, providing a high-quality education to all the District's children. In this respect, WHS is a proxy for the future of the Wakatipu Community as it is responsible for molding the next generation of front-line staff, business leaders, entrepreneurs, and trades people.

Because it is a "whole of community" organisation, we see it as key to the future prosperity of the Wakatipu Basin.

We are now working with our community to help build on this fund and have a goal of raising \$20 million to provide income in perpetuity supporting a broad range of strategic initiatives at WHS beyond what is possible through government funding, as we believe that every WHS student deserves the best start in life.

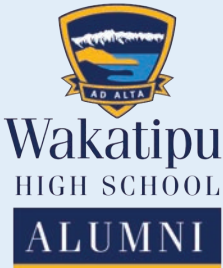

## Our Impact 2021 Making a difference to Wakatipu Youth

In what has been an incredibly difficult time for the Wakatipu community, we are proud to work with a range of amazing supportive businesses and committed community members to make a difference at WHS.



## Since 2013, the WHS Foundation has donated **over \$1.25 Million** to Wakatipu High School.

### Teachers

**WHS Foundation funding has enabled WHS to employ additional teachers above our Government staffing entitlement.**

Additional teaching resource contributes to WHS being able to offer subjects through to Year 13, and also allows for some smaller class sizes that can enable teachers to differentiate to meet the needs of students, supporting their engagement and academic achievement. Additional teaching resource also supports strategic and leadership resourcing.



### Teacher Aides

**Teacher Aides are used in a variety of ways to support students' with learning differences.**

The WHS Foundation paid for one Teacher Aide in 2021. As government-funding entitlement in this area is low, this additional resource is invaluable in being able to support a growing number of students identified as having special educational needs. The increase is attributable to the growth in the school roll, a change in philosophy and better understanding of students' learning needs.

### Senior Leadership Team Development

**Developing leadership capability at senior and middle leader levels at WHS is essential - not only as we continue to grow, but to enable us to continue on our journey towards achieving our vision of delivering Aotearoa New Zealand's best all-round education.**

Leadership development in 2021 was centred on a one-day workshop for middle and senior leaders with Dr Peter Blyde, on balancing our professional, management and leadership work, leadership growth and development, and resilience.

# Awhi support fund

Awhi means to nurture or support in Māori. The Awhi Support and Awhi Bring your own device (BYOD) Funds are WHS Foundation flagship programmes that make a very real difference to financially disadvantaged families.

The most common applications are for uniform and extracurricular activities, as well as BYOD applications.

The contribution from the WHS Foundation to finance Awhi Support for our school community has been more needed and appreciated than ever before in 2021.

The Covid pandemic continues to have a significant financial impact on numerous families, particularly those in the tourism and hospitality industries and businesses that flow from them. There was an increase in both new families applying as well as families that have applied in the past who have been further impacted by loss of work and income.

## Peer Support STARS Programme

WHS Foundation partially funds the Graeme Dingle Foundation Stars Programme at WHS.

The Stars programme uses the teina/tuakana mentoring model and achieves positive and measurable results, including increased academic engagement and achievement for junior and senior students. Stars makes the transition into high school a more positive experience for Year 9 students whilst providing leadership and citizenship development opportunities for senior students. Stars has four components - adventure camp, peer mentoring, community adventure and a community project.
